## Aims of this letter

## What is Autism and how we support our students?

Autism is neurodevelopmental condition that affects 1-2 % of population. Autistic individuals are described as having difficulties with communication, social interaction and repetitive and restrictive behaviours.

However, we also see our students as unique individuals with many strengths. They are the most extraordinary people because autistic individuals are not tied by social expectations and norms and they live in the

moment. Autistic people rarely lie and judge others. They usually have fantastic memories and a very strong sense of justice.

In College Park School, we support our students through creating a calm and engaging learning environment, listening to their voices and incorporating their special interests and affinities in lessons and learning. We provide individualized communication aids to sup-

port their communication and social interaction.

We always respect and celebrate their wishes, views and their uniqueness!

- I'm even a wildlife expert. Probably because of my brilliant memory.
- I enjoy singing when I'm at choir.
- Despite autism, I have many wonderful friendships.
- I'm still looking for a girlfriend!
